

Nutrition Education is Imperative

The **National Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program**, commonly called SNAP-Ed, is a cost-effective strategy that offers evidence-based nutrition education.

The program partners with organizations at both the state and local levels to serve communities through a variety of offerings, including nutrition education classes, social media marketing campaigns and efforts to improve community policies, systems and environments.

This program is **instrumental** in advancing food and **nutrition security** in underserved communities across the country.

Nutrition education teaches participants to:

- **Stretch food dollars:** Learn how to maximize monthly food budget.
- Shop and cook healthy meals: Increase skills and knowledge for preparing nutritious meals.
- Lead an active lifestyle: Encourage and teach how to make physical activity a part of a daily routine.

ACT NOW - With This New Action Alert

On Thursday, May 22, 2025, the House of Representatives passed the *One Big Beautiful Bill*. Among its many provisions is a measure that eliminates the legislative foundation of the National Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program. Specifically, Section 10011 of the bill repeals Section 28 of the Food and Nutrition Act, thereby removing the National Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program in its entirety. The Senate has now taken up the reconciliation process, mirroring the House process to propose its own reconciliation funding bill.

Urge the Senate to oppose eliminating the National Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program.
